Estimates indicate that as many as 1 in 4 Americans will experience a mental health problem or will misuse alcohol or drugs in their lifetimes. These disorders are among the most highly stigmatized health conditions in the United States, and they remain barriers to full participation in society in areas as basic as education, housing, and employment. Improving the lives of people with mental health and substance abuse disorders has been a priority in the United States for more than 50 years. The Community Mental Health Act of 1963 is considered a major turning point in America's efforts to improve behavioral healthcare. It ushered in an era of optimism and hope and laid the groundwork for the consumer movement and new models of recovery. The consumer movement gave voice to people with mental and substance use disorders and brought their perspectives and experience into national discussions about mental health. However over the same 50-year period, positive change in American public attitudes and beliefs about mental and substance use disorders has lagged behind these advances. Stigma is a complex social phenomenon based on a relationship between an attribute and a stereotype that assigns undesirable labels, qualities, and behaviors to a person with that attribute. Labeled individuals are then socially devalued, which leads to inequality and discrimination. This report contributes to national efforts to understand and change attitudes, beliefs and behaviors that can lead to stigma and discrimination. Changing stigma in a lasting way will require coordinated efforts, which are based on the best possible evidence, supported at the national level with multiyear funding, and planned and implemented by an effective coalition of representative stakeholders. Ending Discrimination Against People with Mental and Substance Use Disorders: The Evidence for Stigma Change explores stigma and discrimination faced by individuals with mental or substance use disorders and recommends effective strategies for reducing stigma and encouraging people to seek treatment and other supportive services. It offers a set of conclusions and recommendations about successful stigma change strategies and the research needed to inform and evaluate these efforts in the United States.

Awareness Knowledge Attitude Skills of Telemedicine Among Health Professional Faculty Working in Teaching Hospitals

Introduction: Telemedicine is an emerging technology in health sector in India. The success of any new technology depends on many factors including the knowledge and understanding of the concept, skills acquired, attitude towards technology and working environment by the concerned professionals. Aim: The main objective of this study was to assess the

awareness, knowledge, attitude and skills of telemedicine among the health professionals working in the teaching hospitals of Puducherry Region of India. Materials and Methods: A cross-sectional survey was carried out among various healthcare professionals using a proper sampling frame obtained from a list of teaching hospitals located in Puducherry Union Territory, India. A total of 120 teaching faculties and practitioners from the preclinical, paraclinical and clinical departments were taken up for the study. A pre-validated self-administered questionnaire was used for the survey to assess the awareness, knowledge, attitude and skills of telemedicine. The questionnaires were mailed to the respondents and the completed questionnaires were analysed as per the study objectives using descriptive statistics for the quantitative data and content analysis for the qualitative data. Results: The knowledge level of the respondents was found to be good with 41% of the respondents, 35% possess fair knowledge and 24% don't have adequate knowledge of telemedicine. With regard to the attitude towards telemedicine 39% of the respondents possess high attitude, 31% possess moderate attitude and 30% possess low level of attitude. Investigations on the skills of the respondents on telemedicine showed that 19% respondents are highly skilled or experts, 25% are moderately skilled which includes learners or beginners, and 56% are unskilled in handling telemedicine and its related equipments. Conclusion: The findings of the study suggest that although the respondents experience and knowledge are limited in telemedicine technology a fair number of them have positive attitude towards telemedicine. It is the need of the hour to educate and train the teaching faculty, practicing physicians, residents, medical students and other health professionals about telemedicine and issues related to its use.

Knowledge, Attitudes and Practices of US-based Registered Dietitians Regarding Vitamin D as a Key Nutrient in Public Health

The purpose of this study was to determine the knowledge, attitude and behavior influences of Registered Dietitians (RDNs) regarding Vitamin D (VD). An electronic questionnaire served as the data collection tool developed using previously validated questions and supplemented with behavior construct questions. Content and face validity was assessed by an expert panel; internal consistency was assessed using Cronbach's Alpha. Scores were assessed for knowledge to determine dietitian awareness and competency about VD, attitudes of RDNs regarding importance and practices around VD, and influences on RDN behavior including by other healthcare providers (HCP). Relationships between scales for knowledge, attitude and behavior were examined including the impact of demographic factors on scores. Data was collected from 541 subjects providing informed consent. RDNs were predominantly female, 92%, with good general knowledge of VD (M=84.89, SD=6.71). Regression analysis indicated that increases in age, education and certification inversely impacted behavior scores. Younger RDNs were more influenced in VD behaviors than older RDNs; 42% of RDNs defer to other HCP and 46% defer to lead physician. Dietitians holding Bachelor or Master degrees were more likely to be influenced by others regarding VD practices than dietitians with terminal degrees of PhD or DCN. The results reveal knowledge gaps for the role of VD beyond bone health consistent with high reliance on professional guidelines using evidenced based recommendations from bone health research.

Background Sexual and reproductive health (SRH) awareness in the Pakistani context is a challenging notion as it is an extremely sensitive topic. In Pakistan, adolescents make up 29% of its total population. However, the subject of human sexuality is considered a societal taboo and remain unaddressed. Purpose The aim of this project was to enhance the knowledge, attitude, and practice of the trainers to address SRHR issues and to enhance the knowledge and positive experiences of the community while addressing the SRHR issues through advocacy. Methodology 30 healthcare providers, teachers, and community workers were recruited and trained to provide sexual health education to communities. The three-day training was conducted through a cascade training approach titled as CREATE (Clarify, Reflect, Examine, Aim, Transfer, Evaluate). Pre-test and post-test were conducted to assess change in the knowledge level of participants. Attitude and practice of the youth participants were assessed through an observational audit of the replicated modules. Moreover, focus group discussion was

conducted with the two group of at least 5-6 trainers after one replication of the training in the community. Results 69% were female and 31% were male. 11 participants were health care professionals, 10 were school teachers, and 8 were social workers. All the participants who attended the training showed a significant increase in knowledge level including health care professionals, teachers, and social workers. With the effective mentorship, 86% of the CREATE participants replicated the training modules in different communities i.e., out of 29 participants 25 replicated the modules. These replications were observed by the facilitators and in total 21 replications happened in just two months. Approximately, 800 community people were benefited by the training modules. However, the master trainers of CREATE project conducted hundreds of more independent replications in which approximately more than 5000 participants were benefited. Conclusion CREATE trainers have gained knowledge and achieved a comfort level in addressing SRHR matters after attaining the training regardless of their professional expertise. Through CREATE project the community people gain language skills related to sensitive issues, build positive relations with their children, and enhanced comfort in initiating the conversation on SRHR.
