It explains why this public/private disjuncture exists, what it costs us, and what can be gained by including ordinary abortion in public debate. As *Scarlet A* explains, abortion has been a constitutional right for nearly 45 years, and it should remain one. What we need now are productive conversations about abortion ethics: how could or should people decide whether to exercise this right? Watson paints a rich, rarely seen picture of how patients and doctors currently think and act, and ultimately invites readers to draw their own conclusions.
