and immediately relevant. The case and statutory and regulatory materials support this approach by including the classic Supreme Court cases such as *Brown v. Board of Education*, *Rowley*, *T.L.O.*, and the speech trilogy, along with the recent decisions by the Court such as *Safford Unified Sch. Dist. v. Redding*, *Forest Grove Sch. Dist. v. T.A.*, and *Horne v. Flores*. Leading lower court cases are also provided along with various state and federal statutes and regulations. The special San Francisco "politics of profit" and ethnic conflict are complicated and profoundly influenced by such external forces as regional, state, and federal government, and by the force of a national economy. Frederick Wirt's fascinating study is based on personal interviews with knowledgeable observers and participants, on an extensive review of special reports, and on a firsthand study of the transaction patterns in the political, business, labor, ethnic, and historical life of the city. In the end, the 125-year political history of San Francisco provides solid new insights on the politics of large American cities in the 1970s.
