A group of former gang members come together to help one another answer the question "How can I be a good father when I've never had one?" In *Men Can*, writer, teacher, and father Donald Unger uses his personal experiences, stories of real-life families, as well as representations of fathers in film, on television, and in advertising, to illuminate the role of men in the increasingly fluid domestic sphere.
