Both men, fueled by a certain sense of self-love, spat in the face of authority,

decorum and everything else that mid-century America held dear. True to the ethos of Gonzo Journalism, *Fear and Loathing* is loosely based on two trips (pun intended) Thompson took with an attorney, Oscar Zeta Acosta, to Las Vegas in 1971. Thompson, a professional writer closely associated with some of the country's biggest magazines, was sent by *Sports Illustrated* to write an elongated picture caption for the Mint 400, one of the world's most lucrative off-road races. What was supposed to be a couple hundred words about an off-road race turned into a manuscript nearly ten times the size. The work was rejected outright by *Sports Illustrated*, but accepted by *Rolling Stone*. Thompson notoriously reluctant to review and revise his own works completed five drafts of the book before its publishing. *Fear and Loathing* was met by much critical acclaim. It was thought by Thompson's contemporaries to be one of the best books ever written about the 1960s drug culture.
