In this respect, it greatly aids in the first step of exegesis - the identification of nominal and verbal inflections. Other features include a unique format that allows the student to read in the proper English direction of left to right for an English phrase that translates an individual Hebrew word. This overcomes the constant difficulty of reading backwards, a problem in most previous Hebrew interlinears. A further complication found in most interlinears is determining where the translation for one word ends and the next begins. To eliminate this confusion, all English words used to translate any one Hebrew word are connected with hyphens. Volume 1, covering Genesis-Deuteronomy, includes full explanations of the format, translation theories and techniques, and textual criticism employed throughout the Old Testament volumes. There is also a special introduction for the general reader on how to

use an interlinear for word studies and learning Hebrew. Volume 2 includes Joshua-2 Kings; Volume 3, 1 Chronicles-Song of Songs; and Volume 4, Isaiah-Malachi. the University of Michigan's online translation of the Koran. There it appears thirteen times, but in only two does it mean an internal struggle. In the other eleven, it means warfare. When analyzing words and phrases in the Koran, it is important to know when they were received and written. It is also important to know that the Koran includes material that seems to come from other sources. This has been outlined in Volume 2 of the 1300 Years' War. As noted in Volume 1 of the 1300 Years' War, Muhammad (PBUH) has been thought by many for over 150 years to have suffered from temporal lobe epilepsy associated with visual and auditory hallucinations. These seizures last less than three minutes. It is therefore important to know which suras might have come from a single episode. A table shows this in Volume 1 (table VIII). Many scholars divide the Koran into four major periods: Early Mecca (610-615 AD), Mid-Mecca (616 AD), Late Mecca (617-621 AD) and Medina (622-632 AD). The analysis of the verses

in these periods found that militancy against non-Muslims progresses: 7.7 percent of the verses from Early Mecca are militant. This rises to 10.6 percent in the Mid-Mecca Period, and 18.3 percent in the Late Mecca Period. It tops out at 29.3 percent in the Medina Period. The colored version of the topical guide shows these periods in black, blue, green, and red. In the black and white edition, it shows these four periods of the Koran in plain italics, boldface italics, regular plain type, and boldface regular type. The reason this division is important is the doctrine of abrogation (2:106) given early in the Medina period. This states that verses given later may nullify verses given earlier. Thus, many peaceful verses given in the early parts of the Koran may be nullified by the “verse of the sword” (9:5) given later toward the end of the Prophet’s life: “Slay the idolaters wherever you find them.” So far as I have been able to determine, there has been no stylistic analysis of the Koran. A person studying the Koran or the

history of Islam will find this work most valuable.

This material is

given prior to looking at the literary structure and genre of the Genesis 1-2 text, and then conducting thorough and complete exegetical analyses of the various textual units of Genesis 1-2 in Part Four: God's Book of Scripture. Prior to the exegetical analyses for each of the textual units of Genesis 1-2, (1) the Biblical Hebrew text, (2) a standard English translation, and (3) an Interlinear version of the text of that unit are provided. The Interlinear version consists of (a) the Hebrew text, with (b) SBL transliterations and (c) English glosses below each one of the Hebrew words. Color coding and other types of annotations/highlighting are used throughout Part Four: God's Book of Scripture, in order to help the reader identify important Biblical Hebrew elements, including recurring phrases, important BH words, and key BHVS verb forms. There are more than 2000 detailed footnotes. Many of these footnotes also cross-reference other topics in the book to make it easier for the reader to refer back to a discussion of some

important theme or concept. Excerpts from the entries of reputable Hebrew and Greek lexicons (for words written in the original languages of the Biblical text) are also footnoted. An Appendix is included with a Key to Transliteration and Pronunciation for Biblical Hebrew graphemes; it also has a short section on Biblical Hebrew Accent Markings. Numerous detailed, colored figures are sprinkled throughout the text. In many of these figures, the artwork itself is worth the inexpensive price of the digital edition of this book. Part Six: The Good News is worth reading as a stand-alone exposition of God's Grace, but it also helps put the rest of the book in context. Although the most common (and logical) way to read A Fresh Look at Genesis 1-2 is from start to finish, this 1100-page book was also intended to be used as a reference work. Footnotes direct the reader back to pertinent material in preceding chapters that might not have been read already (or that readers might want to revisit, in order to refresh their memory on some

But Milton's shift to a radically Pauline ethos at that point does not annul the Hebraism of the earlier part

of the work. If Milton resembles Paul, it is not least because his thought could attain harmonies only through dialectic. Milton's poetry derives much of its power from deep internal struggles over the value and meaning of law, grace, charity, Christian liberty, and the relationships among natural law, the Mosaic law, and the gospel.
