road in a Pennsylvania

realities of the Dust Bowl
and Great Depression, and
it would begin with the
lines: "This land is your
land, this land is my
land...." In *This Land That I
Love*, John Shaw writes the
dual biography of these
beloved American songs.

Guthrie and Berlin had
more in common than either

Guthrie's image was defined
by train-hopping, Irving
