Naturalizations - 1981

Of all the records in the public domain no single research group presents such an obstacle to the researcher as naturalization records. Unlike other public records they are not

consolidated in a convenient archive, but are housed instead in a bewildering number of local and municipal repositories--courts, city archives, and record centers--where they remain the least accessible of genealogical records. This is extremely unfortunate because they are practically without equal in genealogical value. In this work, however, D. Kenneth Scott has made a magnificent start in shaping these records into accessible form, herein presenting a comprehensive body of abstracts from the sprawling mass of New York naturalization records for the period 1792 to 1840. The naturalizations and declarations of intention abstracted in this volume--some 10,000 of them--are arranged in more or less chronological order by courts and jurisdiction. Information given in the original documents varies considerably and is so reflected in the abstracts.

The earlier records usually include the name of the petitioner (the alien), his country of origin, the name of the person who recommended him, and his place of residence. The later records usually indicate for each petitioner his name, place of residence, age, place of birth, port and approximate date of arrival in America, his occupation, the names and ages of his wife and children, and various other particulars--all grist for the genealogists' mill. This publication contains index cards for petitions filed in New York City courts between 1792 and 1906. Browse by year, then alphabetically by last name of petitioner. In the upper right-hand corner is the Soundex code, the first letter of the surname

followed by three digits.

Naturalization Index - 1797

Browse these index cards by date, then name. Typing a name in the search box directly below this title may yield the best results.

Information on the card includes the name of the petitioner, city of residence, date, certificate number, country of origin, and the court. The boxes for occupation, age, date of arrival in US, and names of witnesses are seldom completed. The original document, referenced by the certificate number, is more likely to have a petitioner's full information.

petition number you can then locate the original document.

**Naturalization Index** - 1917

These cards contain limited information about the immigrant. Locate an individual by name, then use the numbers to order documents from NARA. The

three digit-number on these index cards is the volume number. The other number is the Declaration of Intention number. Use these numbers and any other data you have on the applicant when requesting copies of the declarations.

**Naturalization Index** - 1906

These records are index cards for naturalization records filed in the US

District and US Circuit courts of Massachusetts. Each card includes the petitioner's full name, residence, age or birthdate, and sometimes the place of birth, wife's name, and a signature.

Very little personal information is typed on these index cards for naturalizations occurring in the Western District of New York. But what's listed is vital to helping you locate original petitions. Search on a name or browse by year, then use the name, petition number, and the date of the petition to request a copy of the document. Directions for doing so are included in the description to "Indexes to Naturalization Records."
