A member of an old military family, a brilliant staff officer and the last commander of the German army before Hitler seized power, Hammerstein, who died in 1943 before Hitler's defeat, was nevertheless an idiosyncratic character. Too old to be a resister, he retained an independence of mind that was shared by his children: three of his daughters joined the Communist Party and two of his sons risked their lives in the July 1944 Plot against Hitler. Hammerstein never criticised his children for their activities; he maintained contacts with the Communists and foresaw the end of Hitler's dictatorship. This is an unorthodox account of the military milieu whose acquiescence to Nazism consolidated Hitler's power and of the heroic few who refused to share in the spoils.

Wonen als arbeider in een textielstad - Jan Timmermans 2015

In de negentiende eeuw groeide het besef dat arbeiders deugdelijk moesten worden gehuisvest, al was het maar ter verhoging van hun arbeidsprestaties, ter voorkoming van revoluties en ter bestrijding van epidemieën die ook goeie burgers bedreigden. Met de Woningwet van 1901 aanvaardde de Nederlandse overheid een taak op dit terrein. In Tilburg, net als in veel andere gemeentes, had men er moeite mee. Woningcorporaties werden tegengewerkt en de kundige directeur Woningbouw moest door politieke intriges het veld ruimen. Ending the Anthropocene - Lieven De Cauter 2021-02-23

In this book, activist philosopher and philosophical activist Lieven De Cauter investigates the idea that if we want to avoid collapse, we have to end the Anthropocene - the geological era of the gigantic, devastating impact of our species on planet Earth. It might even be, he argues, that the collapse of our current, growth-maximizing system is the only hope for the biosphere. Offering case studies on urban activism alongside more general reflections on civic action and social movements, De Cauter moves from the political melancholy caused by the near certainty of climate disaster and meditations on the end of 'the Age of Man?', towards reflections on more hopeful events of our times, like the resurgence of the commons. He hails the rediscovery of this forgotten and excluded third besides public and private, arguing it contains the seeds of another

worldview and another politics. From this new perspective identity and heterotopia, other spaces as places for otherness, can be read in a new light. This collection of writings closes with texts on the corona crisis. Biopolitics, the care for the life of the population by the state, has gained a new topicality in this age of pandemics. The mix of philosophical, theoretical texts and newspaper articles make for a broadly accessible, exciting book of 'activist essays', in accordance with the basic creed of its author: 'pessimism in theory, optimism in practice'. Even if geologists are not quite sure when the Anthropocene has begun, it is high time to end it.

A whimsical, fresh and adventurous coming-of-age story—set against a backdrop of Dutch ingenuity.

The Dutch Maiden - Marente De Moor 2019-08-06

A prize-winning historical romance with powerful currents of sexuality, a rambling old house, a young girl, and the brooding man teaching her to fence.

Fing's War - Benny Lindelauf 2019-05

The Boon family and their indefatigable gallows humor are back in Benny Lindelauf's follow-up to *Nine Open Arms*. Poised to win a scholarship to the nearby teachers college, Fing has high hopes. It's 1938 and her poor family of nine--one father, four brothers, three sisters, and a grandmother--has finally managed to eke out a living in the tiny cigar factory abutting their dilapidated home. But smelling success, her dreamer of a father is determined to expand and Fing's dreams fall apart when she instead has to go to work for the Cigar Emperor, taking care of his new, German wife's eccentric niece. The novel's gripping language, enriched by Yiddish, German, and Dutch dialect, plunges the reader into the world of a large, colorful, motherless family as they navigate the changes World War II visits upon their little town on the border of the Netherlands and Germany. The Whale Library - Zidrou 2021-10-20T00:00:00+02:00

Out on the high seas lives a whale unlike any other, who spends her days reading stories to all who will listen, taken from the vast library hidden in her belly. When the whale bumps into a sea postman's boat one fateful night, it's the beginning of an extraordinary friendship. But not every story can have a happy ending...

Hideous Kinky - Esther Freud 2021-07-13

The debut novel from the author of *Summer at Gaglow*, called "a near-seamless meshing of family feeling, history and imagination" by the *New York Times Book Review* Escaping gray London in 1972, a beautiful, determined mother takes her daughters, aged 5 and 7, to Morocco in search of adventure, a better life, and maybe love. *Hideous Kinky* follows two little English girls -- the five-year-old narrator and Bea, her seven-year-old sister -- as they struggle to establish some semblance of normal life on a trip to Morocco with their hippie mother, Julia. Once in

Marrakech, Julia immerses herself in Sufism and her quest for personal fulfillment, while her daughters rebel -- the older by trying to recreate her English life, the younger by turning her hopes for a father on a most unlikely candidate.

Shocking and wonderful, *Hideous Kinky* is at once melancholy and hopeful. A remarkable debut novel from one of England's finest young writers, *Hideous Kinky* was inspired by the author's own experiences as a child. Esther Freud, daughter of the artist Lucian Freud and great-granddaughter of Sigmund Freud, lived in Marrakech for one and a half years with her older sister Bella and her mother. *Hideous Kinky* is now a major motion picture starring Kate Winslet ("*Titanic*," "*Sense and Sensibility*").

The Cocaine Salesman - Conny Braam 2011

A historical novel based on a true but unexplored aspect of the First World War-the selling of cocaine to both sides by the Dutch-woven around a story of personal betrayal and self-deception. On July 31, 1917, Robin Ryder, the twenty-six-year-old Englishman, clammers from his trench on a Flanders battlefield and charges

fearlessly towards the German lines. Heavily wounded by a German grenade, half his mutilated face will have to be hidden behind a mask. Lucien Hirschland, the traveling salesman of the flourishing Dutch Cocaine Factory, is supplying both sides with drugs to make their soldiers more reckless in the face of overwhelming danger. Closing deals with both the Germans and the British, he flaunts his newfound wealth. At the war's end, extraordinary circumstances find Ryder living in the Hirschland family home where he is lovingly welcomed by Lucien's younger sister, Swanee. Expectations and illusions grow as their lives spin out of and they learn that the war veteran has more to hide than his mutilated face. Conny Braam helped set up and then led the Dutch Anti-Apartheid Movement. Her books include '*Operatie Vulva*', '*De Bokkeslachter*', and '*Zwavel*', a trilogy of novels about the family Abraham.
