Visual Artist Studios in Philadelphia - Martha J. Meiers 2019

While studio space is essential to an artist's practice, the quality and availability of this space varies. Inspired by difficulties in finding affordable and convenient space, I set out to better understand what it takes to rent and manage independent studio spaces. Through researching existing visual art studios in Philadelphia, I aimed to find out what makes a studio space successful and determined common needs and challenges of both tenants and management staff running these facilities. Focusing on three studio facilities in Philadelphia - Bok, Crane Arts, and MaKen Studios - I conducted a multiple case study to explore how these facilities are meeting visual artist tenants' needs, and what a successful independent studio space may look like. Through interviews with management staff and visual artist tenants, as well as a tenant survey, I explored multiple perspectives to better understand common challenges and benefits of these spaces. Most tenants were generally satisfied with their studio situations. However, common tenant needs were identified. The most prominent was the desire for low and stable rent, as well as the need for both private workspace and a space to conduct additional business beyond art making. Most management staffs' concerns related to the ability to meet tenants' individual needs, including outfitting spaces and providing appropriate utilities. While some management is more involved than others, the relationships between the staff and tenants are generally positive. Additionally, some external environmental and economic factors affect both management and tenants. However, additional research on neighborhood changes in Philadelphia and the impact of artists on cities needs to be explored to further address this.

Redefining Gender in American Impressionist Studio Paintings - Kirstin Ringelberg 2017-07-05

Were late nineteenth-century gender boundaries as restrictive as is generally held? In *Redefining Gender in American Impressionist Studio Paintings: Work Place/Domestic Space*, Kirstin Ringelberg argues that it is time to bring the current re-evaluation of the notion of separate spheres to these images. Focusing on studio paintings by American artists William Merritt Chase and Mary Fairchild MacMonnies Low, she explores how the home-based painting studio existed outside of entrenched gendered divisions of public and private space and argues that representations of these studios are at odds with standard perceptions of the images, their creators, and the concept of gender in the nineteenth century. Unlike most of their bourgeois contemporaries, Gilded Age artists, whether male or female, often melded the worlds of work and home. Through analysis of both paintings and literature of the time, Ringelberg reveals how art history continues to support a false dichotomy; that, in fact, paintings that show women negotiating a complex combination of professionalism and domesticity are still overlooked in favor of those that emphasize women as decorative objects. *Redefining Gender in American Impressionist Studio Paintings* challenges the dominant interpretation of American (and European) Impressionism, and considers both men and women artists as active performers of multivalent identities.

"As a catalog of drawings, STUDIO SPACE PRINT/TIME is a rich reproduction of original works, with the bumps and crevices of various surfaces captured by the bright sheen of pressed pastel. The large-scale rubbings from Falls, first created in 2011, offer a study in material and color as well as a record of the artist's mechanical process. Picking up the subtle textures of the architectural space, Falls has captured an impression of the walls, floors and windows that is both objective and plainly abstracted. Rather than presenting Falls' work as a series of photographic replicas, STUDIO SPACE PRINT/TIME builds around a printing procedure and system of design to elaborate on the principles of the original work. Printed on black paper with an underlaying (and carefully-registered) base of white ink, the artist and designer collaboratively explore offset printing as a material process to create, in a sense, a rubbing of a rubbing. The 18 drawings included in the publication (6 windows, walls and floors), are accompanied by a text from Hamilton that gives

an overview of the book's concept and technique. 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Studios Before the System - Brian R. Jacobson 2015-09-01

By 1915, Hollywood had become the epicenter of American filmmaking, with studio "dream factories" structuring its vast production. Filmmakers designed Hollywood studios with a distinct artistic and industrial mission in mind, which in turn influenced the form, content, and business of the films that were made and the impressions of the people who viewed them. The first book to retell the history of film studio architecture, *Studios Before the System* expands the social and cultural footprint of cinema's virtual worlds and their contribution to wider developments in global technology and urban modernism. Focusing on six significant early film corporations in the United States and France—the Edison Manufacturing Company, American Mutoscope and Biograph, American Vitagraph, Georges Méliès's Star Films, Gaumont, and Pathé Frères—as well as smaller producers and film companies, *Studios Before the System* describes how filmmakers first

envisioned the space they needed and then sourced modern materials to create novel film worlds. Artificially reproducing the natural environment, film studios helped usher in the world's Second Industrial Revolution and what Lewis Mumford would later call the "specific art of the machine." From housing workshops for set, prop, and costume design to dressing rooms and writing departments, studio architecture was always present though rarely visible to the average spectator in the twentieth century, providing the scaffolding under which culture, film aesthetics, and our relation to lived space took shape.

Since the early 1800s, African Americans have designed signature buildings; however, in the mainstream marketplace, African American architects, especially women, have remained invisible in architecture history, theory and practice. Traditional architecture design studio education has been based on the historical models of the Beaux-Arts and the Bauhaus, with a split between design and production teaching. As the result of current teaching models, African American architects tend to work on the production or technical side of building rather than in the design studio. It is essential to understand the centrality of culture, gender, space and knowledge in design studios. *Space Unveiled* is a significant contribution to the study of architecture education, and the extent to which it has been sensitive to an inclusive cultural perspective. The research shows that this has not been the case in American education because part of the culture remains hidden.
