unseen Soviet sources,
Jangfeldt has been able
to reconstruct the
events surrounding
Wallenberg's arrest

almost hour by hour and, for the first time, he presents a highly plausible theory about the reasons why Wallenberg was arrested and what happened to him after he disappeared.
